# Minutes from 2022

# Sunday, September 25, 2022

### Call to Order

- 1. The Chair, Johnny Chan Kin called the meeting to order at 12:33 pm.

- 3. He also thanked the Nominating Committee for their prayerful consideration of elder candidates and their recommendation to the Board.
- 4. He then opened in prayer.

### **Reflections from Pastor Daniel Mills**

- 1. He thanked the ministry leaders for their contributions to the Ministry Report and encouraged all members to read it for all the information and stories.
- 2. He thanked the elders, staff, ministry leaders, and the congregation for their involvement and support.
- 3. He reminded us of our focus on prayer and missions. He is thankful for the progress that we have made.

# **Approval of Minutes of 2021 AGM**

1. Moved by Terry Doner. Seconded by Tony Miles. Motion carried. (Vote by showing of hands.)

### **Election of Elders**

- 1. The Nominating Committee has put forward one elder candidate, Claude Mathieu. His bio was included with the pre-AGM information package sent to members.
- 2. The Chair noted that Kris Wong will assist members with electronic voting if they do not have a phone or tablet.
- 3. Vote results will be announced at the end of the meeting.

# **Election of Members for Nominating Committee for 2023**

- 1. Johnny Chan Kin reviewed the composition and purpose of the Nominating Committee.
- 2. Bev Gonsalves' and Barb Doner's names have been put forward as nominees to the Nominating Committee for the 2023 AGM.
- 3. Voting results will be given at the end of the meeting.

# **Financial Report**

1. Nesa Gulasekharam reviewed key elements of the audited financial statements provided by Norton McMullen and approved by the Board of Elders.

# **Appointing of the Auditor for 2022-2023**

1. Moved by Nesa Gulasekharam that Norton McMullen be appointed as our auditors for the fiscal year 2022-2023. Second: Winston Miller. Voting results will be given at the end of the meeting.

# Presentation of 2022-2023 Budget

- 1. Treasurer Nesa Gulasekharam reviewed the 2022-2023 budget given in the pre-AGM package to members.
- 2. Salaries and benefits are anticipated to be higher due to a full complement of staff compared to previous year and current year salary increases.
- 3. The Operating Fund is more or less in balance, in addition we have budgeted \$107,000 for capital expenditures. The total of restricted funds are anticipated to be in a deficit position due mostly to increased expenditures for missions.
- 4. He reviewed the proposed Capital Expenditures. He noted that the largest expenditure of \$48,000 was for the replacement of outside doors. He also mentioned that we have an older building that requires many upgrades. Currently capital expenditures are paid for from the Operating Fund. The Board is in discussion about raising funds separately for major projects such as the replacement of the sound system and sewer hookup. The Board will keep the congregation informed.
- 5. Nesa also fielded some questions from the membership on the budget.
- 6. Electronic voting closed.

# **Women as Elders - Next Steps**

- 1. The Board has asked Pastor Daniel Mills to present this issue today.
- 2. Unity of the body will be most important. This will reflect the love of Jesus.
- 3. Unity will also be demonstrated by prayer. A team specifically for this issue will be assembled. Members were encouraged to send a note to Daniel if they wished to participate on that team. Next, he outlined the steps in the process:
  - i. First step: a roundtable discussion on Monday October 24, 2022 at 7 pm. This is intended to give our congregation an opportunity for discussion and to share their thoughts. Feedback and comments will be collected and given to the Board.
  - ii. After that roundtable, educational and theological material will be provided on both positions. Congregants will be encouraged to pray and read those materials.
  - iii. Public teaching will be the next step. Dates to be announced later. Unity again will be emphasized.
  - iv. Before the summer 2023 another Roundtable discussion will be held so that feedback and comments can be collected.
  - v. Voting will occur according to the C&MA Constitution. Therefore a 2/3 majority vote of members will be required. The goal is to have this vote at the 2023 AGM.
- 4. Daniel fielded questions from the membership on the above process.

# **Voting Results**

- 1. Vote: Claude Mathieu was confirmed as an elder.
- 2. Vote: Barb Doner and Bev Gonsalves were confirmed as members of Nominating Committee.
- 3. Vote: Norton McMullen has been confirmed as auditors for 2022-2023.

### **Mission Sundays**

We started out our year with a large overview of Missions

In November, we heard from International Workers, Kevin and Carol Lim, about how God is breaking down social barriers in Cambodia. On that Sunday evening, they shared personal stories and experiences as we got to interact with their whole family and spend some time in prayer with and for them. In January, Brian Mullins from Wycliffe Canada shared how Wycliffe is striving to end Bible poverty, since not having a Bible in

In May, we had the privilege of having Tim and Nancy Moore visit with us. They shared a little bit about how God is using them in their work to combat human trafficking in Thailand while also leading the Justice

### **International Partners**

We are thankful for the generous hearts of our congregation that enables us to support a number of international causes. Jesus tells us that we are more blessed to give than to receive, so we give with a thankful and cheerful heart. We gave \$50,000 to the Global Advance Fund to continue to send people to other nations to proclaim the word of God and make multiplying disciples. This fund supports our Alliance International Workers in unreached places. The damage from the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria to not only people's homes but also their lives weighed heavily on our hearts as UAC gave over \$12,000 in support of relief efforts there. The devastation in Ukraine continued to be in our thoughts and prayers as we gave \$1,600 to support relief work. The Jaffrey Project is an Alliance Missions focus, setting its sights on bringing the good news to unreached people groups in South Asia. We were delighted to give \$6,100 to support the effort to reach around two billion people in that region. We continued our support for the anti-trafficking organization For Freedom International in Thailand with \$5,000 which went towards building safe houses for people escaping bondage from trafficking. As our Seamless Link family, we also financially supported the Burnetts directly with \$4,525. Our partnership with Wycliffe Bible Translators continued as we highlighted them on a Mission Sunday and gave over \$3,500 to support their work and that of Alan Yam.

### **Canadian Partners**

Within Canada, we invested into New Ventures with \$25,000 as they seek to empower church planters, new expressions of the church, and innovative methods of reaching people with the gospel in Canada. Locally, we contributed

of her work among the Chinese Diaspora in to the RISE Support Centre (formerly called the Markham-Stouffville Crisis Pregnancy Centre) drop-off point for Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes through Samaritan's Purse. Our congregation packed and collected shoeboxes for children in need around the world and other churches and people in our community dropped off shoe boxes as well. In total, we collected 3,722 shoeboxes, which represents 3,722 children who will be touched and impacted with the love of Jesus through a simple shoebox wrapped with gifts.

Through our prayer ministry, we also prayed for God to prepare hearts for Jesus. Summer prayer walks took place in the community surrounding the church from June to August. This summer, we expanded that to invite people to walk and pray in their own home neighbourhoods. We may not recognize results from these prayer walks but we trust that God our Father is working as we pray.

As we sought to become a house of prayer, we found ways to encourage and grow prayerful habits. This included a Sunday morning prayer service in September and a 40 day prayer challenge run by Pastor Daniel in the New Year. We also initiated a bi-weekly Tuesday evening Zoom prayer meeting. It doesn't sound like a lot, but as it says in Zechariah 4:10 (NLT) - "Do not despise these small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin..." Nevertheless, opportunities are provided for all - of any age

embracing the rich gift of prayer.

One Sunday, a neighbourhood woman walked into the church asking for prayer. A UAC couple took it upon themselves to stay back to listen and pray with her... for hours!

In the spring, 30 people attended a "Prayer Ministry Luncheon". There, they heard about our prayer ministry and were challenged to consider We now have teams of:

- 5 people in 'Before Service Prayer' (BSP)
- 16 people in 'After Service Prayer' (ASP)

One new initiative is "Mobile ASP". Each week a prayer team member can be found in the midst of the congregation after the service. This way prayer can be immediately available to the people rather than having to step up to the front. Thank you to each person who has now joined the team!

# **MORE THAN JUST** PRACTICAL NEEDS

## **Master's Pantry**

We have seen God at work in the lives of many people this year. Our Master's Pantry helps people in a practical way by providing them monthly food, which includes non-perishable items, produce, dairy, meat and sometimes eggs when available. Through meeting these needs, we are demonstrating the love of Jesus which opens the door to minister to them in a deeper way, both spiritually and emotionally. As we see these clients every month, a big part of the ministry is to have our volunteers mingle with the Since 2020 when the pandemic started, we clients and build a bit of a relationship with them. Many often say that they feel uplifted, knowing we genuinely care and will take the time to listen and pray with them. We are reaching lives for Jesus through this ministry.

We serve around 100 to 115 families each month. Our two pantries offer delivery service to people who are unable to pick up due to physical disabilities. Since Covid, we have seen on average 1 to 2 new families each time we open. We are privileged to have a wonderful group of volunteers of about 25 at each pantry serving faithfully. This includes those who help with the

Thursday set up, our shoppers, and those who do the deliveries. Amongst the group of volunteers, the dedicated Unionville Youth Council, under the leadership of Don Roe, also faithfully serve, often twice a month! This past year we have had former students, now at university, come back to help when they are in town which goes to show how much Master's Pantry has influenced even the lives of our volunteers. All our volunteers are a huge blessing, and it would not run without

have been operating Master's Pantry as a drivethrough. The clients continue to come in their cars, sometimes with someone who brings them, we register them, chat a bit, and offer prayer. They pull up to the doors and get their boxes of food. Still, they have missed spending time inside where they could fellowship with each other... so now we aim to restart that portion of the ministry and serve coffee, juice, tea, and light snacks. Then we can chat more intentionally, hold a short devotional, and pray with those who want prayer. Please pray that we will have enough volunteers to make this happen.

I had the privilege of walking alongside one of our clients who was very ill and subsequently had an amputation of her right leg above the knee. I was one of the first people she reached out to, so I spent time visiting her in the hospital helping her with things she needed, and supporting her with visits once she entered rehab. We were able to help her with some practical needs in her home, and two of our team and myself went in and helped get her home ready for her return. As I continue to walk alongside her, she has expressed to me how much it has meant to have me encouraging her positively and being with her during this difficult time. I had not realized at the time how important me being there was to her, encouraging her and praying with her, often as she cried and felt like she could not make it. It is so beautiful to be able to have touched this dear woman's life for Jesus.

The Pastoral Care Ministry (PCM) continues to be an integral part of our fellowship. At times, when it's not possible to visit a brother or sister, we step in and communicate with them

by making telephone calls; sending emails and cards; blessing them with a bouquet of flowers; or by providing a meal.

We want to thank Al Davy from the depths of our hearts for the leadership that he has provided to this team these last couple of years. He has stepped down from this position at the end of August and his wisdom will be sorely missed.

My time of service has been both enriching and rewarding, and I thank the BOE for providing me with the opportunity of serving.

# PROVIDING COMMUNITY CARE

Three significant trends have emerged over the The third trend is that, as we review each request, past year as the Community Care Committee seeks to provide financial support to members of our community who have short term financial needs. The first trend is that the committee has been much busier than in past years. There is greater need in our community, as we have had fourteen requests in the last fiscal year compared to just four the previous year.

The second trend is that the requests are typically for higher levels of support. Whereas in the past many requests were for a few hundred dollars to help with a utility bill or provide food, we are now regularly seeing significant fourfigure requests for things like rent or dental bills. Unfortunately, credit card debt is not something that we are able to help with, but we regularly counsel clients to seek financial management advice to try and get their debt under control.

it is becoming increasingly difficult to ascertain that the request is legitimate. We seem to have to probe deeper into the client's lives in order to get a true sense of their request. Please pray that God would continue to grant us wisdom as we seek to be good stewards of the funds available.

While we cannot share specific details about individual cases due to privacy concerns, we have been encouraged by several opportunities this past year to pray with clients on the phone and offer invitations to attend UAC. Our hope is that there will be many more such opportunities in the future.

We extend our thanks to each one who supports the Community Care Fund and makes this ministry possible. We would also like to thank each member of the committee for their valuable service over this past year.




